The speaker says: "I'm 24 years old. When I came here, I was 22. And so living in Reutte for the first year was rather difficult for me. I like to be around a lot of people, especially people my age who are in similar situations, and in Reutte that was very hard to find. I made a friend who was 20 years old, but that's the closest that came to my age. And so it was also in the middle of the pandemic. Everything was closed, no bars were open, so it was incredibly hard to meet new people." In the small town of Reutte, Jack therefore hardly met any young adults.

The speaker says: "And so it was also in the middle of the pandemic. Everything was closed, no bars were open, so it was incredibly hard to meet new people. I <u>often spent my time with my co-workers</u>, who were over 40 years old. And while they were very nice and incredibly accommodating and generous to me, there was still something missing from my social life [...]." With all public places shut down, Jack therefore did activities with colleagues.

2

The speaker says: "[...] other teaching assistants. And there are <u>plenty of other teaching assistants</u>, doing <u>the same thing that I was doing in Innsbruck</u>. And whenever I went to Innsbruck <u>to see them</u> I always got <u>a kind of pleasure</u> that I couldn't get hanging out with my 40-year old co-workers." When Jack visited Innsbruck during the first year, he therefore enjoyed meeting more people like him.

3

The speaker says: "[...] I was at home almost every day, didn't do anything. I was, you know, <u>spending a</u> <u>lot of time teaching myself to learn languages</u>, but I got very lonely sometimes." In Reutte during the cold season, Jack therefore developed new skills.

4

The speaker says: "And I <u>was able to experience a lot more culture: a lot of museums, and the *Leokino*, <u>films, dance music clubs, concerts, bars</u> – there are plenty of other teachings assistants that I've met over my time here. And so I found much more of a community that I identify with in Innsbruck." When Jack lived in Innsbruck, he could therefore do more free time activities.</u>

5

The speaker says: "And as far as teaching goes, however, <u>the experience</u> I had in Reutte <u>was much more</u> <u>personal</u>." Compared to Innsbruck, in Reutte Jack therefore got to know the people better.

6

The speaker says: "[...] in Reutte I <u>was being invited almost every single week to come over for coffee</u> after school, or for dinners, to go on hikes with my teachers." In Reutte, Jack therefore regularly visited his colleagues.

7

The speaker says: "I <u>saw every class every single week, or every other week</u>, and I got to know my students in a way that I – like – cannot in Innsbruck at the HTL, because of the way I'm scheduled [...]." In the school in Reutte, Jack therefore taught his pupils more often.

8

The speaker says: "[...] city life is a lot more busy than this rural life and people <u>seem to be a bit more</u> caught up in all the activities that a city can provide. Sometimes it can be overwhelming, I think. So you have school, maybe you have certain <u>classes you wanna take afterwards</u>, or you're going to certain <u>cultural events</u> that you don't have as much time to, you know, spend with the TA, than maybe you'd like to." For Jack, people in Innsbruck therefore do many different things.

The speaker says: "And there you are in the middle of a drought that's gone on for <u>3 years</u> – the worst in California history." California has therefore had a water problem for three years.

1

The speaker says: "With new restrictions mandated by Governor Jerry Brown, a recommended shower is <u>five minutes</u> now." An ideal shower in California should therefore be five minutes.

2

The speaker says: "That's Soraya Shockley, and along with our friends Amber Lee and Deanna Martin, we conducted <u>a little experiment</u> when we first noticed a difference in the water." Jenny and her friends therefore did a little experiment.

3

The speaker says: "Tap water in Oakland has typically been as good as <u>any bottled water</u> you could buy in the store. You could barely tell the difference between the two." The water in Jenny's city was therefore compared to bottled water.

4

The speakers say: "When my friends tasted the bottled water, they all pretty much said the same thing: 'I don't really taste anything.' But when it came to the water from the tap: 'It tastes like <u>there's something in</u> <u>B</u> that's not in A.' 'It <u>doesn't taste as clean</u>.' 'OK, yeah, B <u>tastes weird</u>.'" Concerning the content, the tap water therefore had something else in it or tasted weird.

5

The speaker says: "Normally our tap water comes from the bottom of our reservoir: <u>clean, fresh, cold</u> water." The drinking water before the water shortage was therefore clean or fresh or cold.

6

The speaker says: "So at the end of March, it started taking water from a higher part of the reservoir instead – where it's <u>warmer</u>." The temperature of the drinking water was therefore warmer than before.

7

The speaker says: "We heard from our <u>customers</u> loud and clear.' That's Abby Figueroa. She's a spokesperson for a local water district. [...] Figueroa says that so many <u>customers</u> complained [...]." According to an expert, the new source of water was therefore criticized by customers.

8

The speaker says: "Adults may have a hard time adjusting to the change, but for teens like me who grew up with the drought, this is our <u>new normal</u>." To teenagers the water shortage is therefore their new normal.

The speaker says: "I was <u>staying in a hotel near the Prater</u>, which is a huge park." For her visit to Vienna, Anne therefore booked accommodation close to a large green space.

The speaker says: "My meeting was scheduled for 9 o'clock, so I thought: 'Well, time after breakfast to <u>go for a walk</u>.'" Before her work day began, Anne therefore explored the surroundings of her hotel.

2

The speaker says: "There were a few dog walkers out, a few runners, but otherwise I had the place to myself." Apart from a few other people, Anne was therefore almost alone in the park.

3

The speaker says: "I looked around and I had no idea where I was." When Anne wanted to end her walk, she therefore realised that she was lost.

4

The speaker says: "I spoke to him in German and he <u>answered in a, with a very strong Irish accent with</u> <u>his few words of German that he didn't speak German</u>." Anne therefore met a guy with a pet who at first communicated in very poor German.

5

The speaker says: "And when he discovered that I was from England, he <u>was very keen to tell me about</u> <u>his family</u> that lived in England." Learning where Anne came from, the guy therefore started a lengthy conversation.

6

The speaker says: "She was American, but she <u>knew vaguely where the campus was. She waved her</u> <u>hand in the general direction</u>." Anne met a girl who therefore only showed the way approximately.

7

The speaker says: "And he looked at me with big eyes and just <u>shook his head</u>." Anne therefore asked a delivery worker who did not talk to her.

8

The speaker says: "And then I asked a lady who <u>gave me very precise directions</u>." Afterwards, a woman therefore explained exactly where to go.

9

The speaker says: "I was very hot and, and a little bit panicky and I came into the meeting [...]." When Anne arrived at work, she therefore felt uncomfortable.

The speaker says: "The boat was chartered by Warner Brothers Productions to film scenes from the movie 'Disclosure' for eight days. I was told to just accommodate the film company and <u>do pretty much</u> <u>whatever they wanted</u>." For the film *Disclosure*, Mark was therefore asked to help the film team.

1

The speaker says: "They set up two big, huge generators that <u>cost millions of dollars</u> because they are the most silent generators in the world just made for film production." For some of the equipment, the film company therefore paid a lot of money.

2

The speaker says: "They had trailers for the actors, trailers for costumes, everything that Hollywood uses to film a movie on board the ferry, including trucks from caterers that <u>came</u> from Hollywood <u>with really</u> <u>fabulous food</u> for everyone." Large road vehicles therefore brought great meals.

3

The speaker says: "Michael Douglas was in all the ferryboat scenes and when he came to work in the morning, he had his head down and he went right into his trailer and he <u>wouldn't talk to anybody</u>." When arriving on the set, Michael Douglas therefore refused to speak.

4

The speaker says: "When they decided to shoot a scene, they would shoot it with <u>his stand-in, who</u> <u>looked very much like him, dressed the same as him, and just stood there</u> [...]." Before filming the final version of a scene, one person therefore replaced Michael Douglas.

5

The speaker says: "And when everything looked perfect, Michael Douglas would come out instead of the stand-in. He would speak his lines and it <u>was usually one take</u>. Everything was perfect." When they filmed a scene with Michael Douglas, he therefore mostly just needed to do it once.

6

The speaker says: "[...] we would get really, really fancy meals. So good that I told my wife: 'I will not be home for eight days.' And we worked about 16 to 18 hours a day, so I just slept on the ferry." Mark therefore said to his partner that he would spend the nights on the boat.

7

The speaker says: "However, at about 10 o'clock at night we quit shooting and he would just come out of his trailer and he <u>was the nicest, most friendly guy. He shook everyone's hand, wanted to know who</u> <u>you were, what you did and just a super nice guy</u>." After a day's work, Michael Douglas therefore treated everybody kindly.
